## **St. Joseph Parish, LaRue, Marion County 1864-2004**

(Concluded, from Vol. XXXIX, No. 3)

### **St. Joseph a Parish**

On September 1, 1883 the house and lot north of the church were purchased by Most Rev. William Henry Elder (Coadjutor to Archbishop Purcell) from Margaret Smallwood & John M. Smallwood her husband for \$1,500 "In trust for the use & benefit of the Roman Catholic Congregation of St. Joseph of LaRue."<sup>20</sup> This prepared for the arrival in March, 1884, of Rev. John B. Dickhaus as LaRue's first resident pastor. The resident pastors in the earlier days (and some of the later ones) were responsible

for various missions and stations at different times, which provided a little financial support to help the small congregation at LaRue but created a sometimes heavy burden on the pastor. These were St. Lawrence O'Toole at Caledonia (eastern Marion County, beyond Marion), Our Lady of Lourdes at Ada (northwestern Hardin County, beyond Kenton), and stations at Dunkirk (northern Hardin County), Forest (northeast Hardin), Mt. Victory (southern Hardin), and Richwood (Union County). All of these could be reached by railroad.

Changes in the various missions were effected throughout the years. During the pastorate of Father Brinker (1919-1923), Ada was removed from the responsibility of the pastors of La Rue. According to one account, Father Westerhaus (1933-1942) lived principally at Ada, but the annual directories indicate he lived at LaRue. (Cecilia Snyder was organist in his time.) From 1942 until 1951 a total of eleven pastors or administrators were placed in charge of the congregation. Certainly this was a "lost decade," with no consistent leadership.

Early in 1945 the parishes and missions in Marion and Kenton counties became part of the Diocese of Columbus. (The decree establishing the new diocesan boundaries was issued by the Apostolic Delegate on January 12, 1945.) At that time St. Joseph congregation comprised some 94 souls in twenty families. The pastor, Rev. William J. Meyer, C.P.P.S., also had charge of the twenty souls at St. Lawrence O'Toole mission in Caledonia. The care of Caledonia was turned over to St. Mary Parish in Marion in February, 1949.<sup>21</sup>

### The Church

We have a fairly good record of the continuous improvements that were lovingly made to little St. Joseph church through the years.

The church had a foot of water in it during the great flood on Easter Sunday, March 24, 1913.

Father Brinker made improvements to the rectory and redecorated the church, obtaining an old altar from Kenton. His successor Father Kelly put a hardwood floor in the church and made a center aisle in the church instead of the former two small side aisles.

One of the first acts of Rev. William J. Meyer, C.P.P.S., as pastor in 1945 was to obtain permission from Bishop Ready to replace the pews in the church. He claimed the existing ones were the same pews, though often repaired, that had been installed in "1862" "and are of the small or half type pews." With new pews the church would seat 97. He also wanted to modify the stairway and straighten and service the floor, at a total cost of \$1,600.<sup>22</sup> Permission for this work was granted. He also

obtained an electric organ for the church.

Immediately upon his arrival as pastor in 1955, Father Carter obtained permission to have the church refinished and to add a sacristy and social hall to the rear. The cost was some \$4,000.<sup>23</sup>

In 1950 the LaRue congregation began to receive substantial monetary assistance from the Diocese for the various improvements to the property. The parish was included in the new cooperative plan set up by Father Kulp that year, so it would receive funds from the diocesan missionary appeal.<sup>24</sup> In February, 1959, the Diocese sent St. Joseph Parish \$1,000 from the Flood Relief Collection, to help victims and to help repair any damage to church property.<sup>25</sup> Assistance from the Diocesan Development Fund was sent at the end of 1959 and 1960 and \$1,000 was sent in January, 1962 and again in January, 1963.

In January of 1960 Father Patterson received permission to remodel the church, replacing the vestibule with a center entrance flanked by rooms across the front, with a new stone facade. The cost was \$500. Brother Maurus Wolf made sculptures for the new facade.

In June, 1963 permission was given to construct an addition to the rear of the social hall, which was attached to the rear of the church, about fifty feet long or as far as building regulations would permit. This comprised two classrooms and cost about \$4,000.<sup>26</sup> This was under construction in 1964. Bishop Isenmann came to LaRue to bless the new addition in 1965 and to celebrate the parish centennial. At this time he cancelled the debt of \$5,000 the parish owed to the diocese.

New Stations of the Cross were donated by the family of a deceased parishioner in 1966.

### **Religious Education**

The surviving record of religious education in LaRue is rather spotty. We have made note of the following.

In 1880 Father Siebenfoercher complained that he had never seen a place where parents were so negligent in sending children to catechism, and where children were so extremely backward in coming to

instructions, and thirdly where among so many people it was so difficult to find someone to hear the catechism lessons in the absence of a priest, as at La Rue.<sup>27</sup> Later that year Father Dexter spent a week in LaRue instructing the children.<sup>28</sup>

In the mid-1940s Father Meyer gave religious education once a week using rooms in the public high school. But by 1949 the Sisters of Charity were coming from Marion on Sundays to give catechism classes.<sup>29</sup> The Sisters had first come to Marion in 1875 but no record has been found of their first arrival in LaRue. They continued this practice and in the late 1960s the Sisters were teaching eight grades, using rooms in the public school across the street from the church. By 1975 there was only one Sister (Sister Margaret), but she had the cooperation of eight lay women and one lay man: Agnes Miller, Sally Pinchock, Pat Dean, Margaret Juzwiak, Carol Scharf, Jeanette Dean, Millie Hartie, John Juzwiak, and Cindy Bookman.<sup>30</sup>

In the late 1970s the mission provided only very limited catechesis; all children in grades 1 through 8 were taught together, and, according to some parents, very little was taught. This situation was improved as time went on. Life Teen and the CYO became active in LaRue.

### **Organizations and Education for Adults**

Our record of organizations for adults is even sparser than that of religious education. There was an Altar Society as early as 1879, as noted by Father Siebenfoercher in his *Catholic Local News*. Father Brinker revived this society in the early 1920s. About

1948 Father Cleary began the parish Council of Catholic Women, with Ann Benson as first president. Father Healy started the Holy Name Society and a study club for young married couples. In 1971 (the year of the earliest surviving Status Animarum reports) the parish hosted an adult religious education program and a sacramental program, both run by Sisters from Kenton. A Bible study program was begun in January, 1972. There also was a Women's Guild, which was the only adult organization that continued to operate until the parish was closed. Its officers in 1975 were Millie Harris, Rose Erdy, Marsha Thompson, and Margaret Juzwiak.

In the 1980s and 1990s it was obvious that "a great need for re-evangelization" existed.<sup>31</sup> Parish renewal projects were begun. Weekly classes for adults were held on Sunday mornings; Lenten discussions were held on weekday evenings. The Life in the Spirit Seminar was employed. Members of St. Joseph were invited to Kenton and Marion for Bible study. Father Mathewson encouraged some 130 known fallen-away Catholics to return to

the faith via mailings and personal contact and had some small success. But as the parish population dropped, the programs became fewer.

### **Later years**

Father Healy in 1949, due to the "wholehearted desire of the parishioners" started offering a second Mass on Sunday mornings.<sup>32</sup> It apparently was during Father Metzger's days that the early Mass on Sunday morning was moved to Saturday evening.

As pastor from 1967 to 1969, Father McLaughlin drove to Marion Catholic High School to teach, but still found the job an easy one. There were about 70 families and about 210 persons attended the two Sunday Masses. About half the parishioners lived in Richwood in Union County, where he offered Mass on weekdays. By 1981 the parish's Saturday evening Mass was being offered in Richwood (in Stotchek's Funeral Home as of 1991). Later in the '90s the Saturday Mass was moved back to St. Joseph Church.

A Parish Council existed from at least 1971.

Some of the presidents through the years were John Myers of Richwood, Ed. Benson, Mary Dutton, Stan Juzwiak, Fred Dutton, and Wendy Crabtree.

In 1974 the parish had no debt and \$14,500 cash on hand. In 1975 a parish directory was issued, listing some 86 households, including 29 with Richwood addresses. Parish council members were William Middlesworth, Mary Buyer, Mary Scharf, Rose Erdy, Stan Juzwiak, Carl Rubeck, Jim Thompson, Ray Clark, Terry Hartle, John Myers, Agnes Miller, and Roy Buyer.

In 1975 the lot and house adjoining the church on the south, which had belonged to a parishioner who died, was purchased at a cost of \$7,500.

The mission faltered in the late 1970s. Attendance at Sunday Mass dropped from about 200 to a low of 77 in 1981 but then recovered to 148 in 1989. After that year attendance dropped slowly and through the 1990s was about one hundred. In 2003 the October count was only sixty-six. Father Losh continued to offer a weekend Mass in Richwood even though attendance dropped to about ten.

When Father Losh was scheduled to retire on July 12, 2004, Bishop Griffin had no priest to send to LaRue to replace him. The Marion Vicariate planning process had already identified the closing of St. Joseph Parish as a necessary step at some future date. Having consulted the Presbyterial Council on May 20, 2004, Bishop Griffin suppressed the parish effective July 13, 2004. Since the parish had never had any defined boundaries, the Bishop left the former members free to choose what parish they would now attend.<sup>33</sup> Those who moved to Immaculate Conception Parish in Kenton took with them an outdoor statue of St. Joseph with the Christ Child, which now stands on the east side of Immaculate Conception Church. The parish property was sold in the spring of 2007.

### Vocations

Nine religious vocations from the parish were in one family, nine of the ten children of Kilian and Clara Victoria (Scharf) Wolf. Kilian had come to America with his brother from their native village of

Zahlback in Bavaria in 1877 at the age of nine but soon returned home. He migrated to America permanently in 1890. Clara was a native of Columbus, born to immigrants from Waserlos in Bavaria and from Switzerland. Kilian farmed along the LaRue and Agosta Pike (east of La Rue).
